Introduction

Thank you for joining the Safe Place Scheme

The scheme is coordinated by the Teeswide Safeguarding Adults Board (TSAB) in conjunction with the Tees Local Authorities; Hartlepool Borough Council (HBC), Middlesbrough Council (MBC), Redcar & Cleveland Borough Council (RCBC) and Stockton-on-Tees Borough Council (SBC) and Cleveland's Office of Police Crime Commissioner (OPCC).

It is great to have you involved to help make our communities safer places for people who might be vulnerable.

This pack includes:

- Information about the Safe Place Scheme for staff and volunteers please make sure that everyone who works or volunteers in your business or organisation reads this information and watches the online Safe Place Training Video - https://youtu.be/P7-ASS3x6gM
- Contact logs to keep a record of how you have helped people
- Annual audit form Safe Place Scheme leads will visit/contact you once a year to complete this with you
- Information about other similar 'safe place' initiatives that you may wish to sign up to
- Safe Place Scheme window sticker (for new venues). If you need a replacement sticker, please contact your local representative.

















What is a Safe Place?

- A place people can go if they don't feel safe or need some help.
- A place in the community that people know is there in case they need it. This can help them to be more confident to go out independently.

Who is a Safe Place for?

- Anyone who might be/feel vulnerable, this can include people with:
 - · A learning disability
 - Autism
 - A physical disability
 - Dementia
- Or someone who is suffering from abuse or neglect.

How can Safe Places Help?

Safe Place Scheme venues can provide:

- A point of contact for anyone who needs it
- A safe, friendly and welcoming environment where people feel able to ask for help
- A place where someone can rest if they feel unwell, anxious, upset, afraid or lost
- A place where people feel listened to
- Staff who can offer help and advice or help the person call someone they know

Training

Each Local Authority contact will discuss with you the training required depending on the needs of the people within your location. However, most locations may only need to ensure that all staff and volunteers read and understand this information pack, and watch this training video https://www.tsab.org.uk/campaigns-and-initiatives/find-support-in-your-area/safe-place-scheme/ to be able to competently operate as a Safe Place location. Staff should be trained about the scheme on an annual basis.

What do you need to do?

- ✓ Display the Safe Place Scheme posters/window stickers so that they are visible from the outside, to show that you are part of the scheme.
- ✓ Create a welcoming environment:
 - o Staff should provide good customer service; be friendly helpful and understanding
 - o Make sure there is a place to sit
 - Where possible, have an area where someone can go and speak privately if they need to.
- ✓ Some people who come into the venue may be upset or distressed, and staff need to be patient and understanding. They should help the person in the most appropriate way, listening and respecting their wishes. This may include ringing a nominated contact person, which they may have recorded on a Safe Place Scheme Contact Slip. - ✓ Help to promote awareness of the scheme within your organisation and the general public, with the use of newsletters, social media etc.
- ✓ If you provide help and support to someone as part of the Safe Place Scheme, you should complete a Contact Log* after the person has left, and send this to the relevant Local Authority contact.
- ✓ Complete a Self-Audit Report* every year and return this to the Local Authority. This is usually completed during the summer months.
- ✓ Inform your Local Authority Lead if your venue closes or you no longer wish to be a part of the scheme

Other 'Safe Place' Initiatives

Safe Spaces

What is it?

In response to growing concerns about domestic abuse, Hestia Charity and UK SAYS NO MORE launched 'Safe Spaces' which includes a number of venues across the UK, some examples include: Boots, Superdrug, Morrisons, banks and pharmacies.



Similar to the Ask ANI campaign (but is not limited to pharmacies and jobcentres), participating venues provide a safe space for anyone experiencing domestic abuse to safely call a helpline, support service or loved one.



Online Safe Spaces

What is it?

It can be very difficult for victims of domestic abuse to seek or find help, particularly if their online activity is being monitored closely by a perpetrator.





Victims can click on the logo, which brings up a separate pop-up box and displays important information about domestic abuse and where to find local support. Pressing the 'escape' button quickly shuts down the page and the domestic abuse pop-up page does not appear in any internet history, making it much safer for victims to find help.

Third Party Hate Crime Reporting Centres

What is it?

These are places for people who don't want to speak directly to the police but who want to report a hate crime. A hate crime is any crime which is targeted at a victim due to their perceived Race, Religion, Disability, Sexual Orientation or Transgender identity.



These locations provide support and can forward details of the incident to the police and support services. This does not have to include personal details if the person doesn't wish the police to

investigate the incident, but can alert the police to areas where hate crime is a particular issue. A list of reporting centres can be found here:
